At Hessle High School, two levels of The Duke of Edinburgh Award (DofE) are run: Bronze in Year 9 and Silver in Year 10. The Awards have proved popular and successful for the past 5 years since it has been reintroduced to the school, with over 300 students participating.

The DofE Award is a unique and highly regarded program that offers our students the chance to develop personally, socially, and physically.

The award requires students to balance schoolwork, extracurricular activities, and the DofE commitments. This teaches effective time management and prioritization, teamwork, leadership, collaboration and communication skills.

Our Year 7 students are developing a strong foundation in physical education through a varied and exciting curriculum. The focus is on building key skills, promoting teamwork, and encouraging a lifelong love of sport and physical activity.

Cricket

Students learn the fundamentals of batting, bowling, and fielding, alongside game strategy and teamwork. Emphasis is placed on hand-eye coordination and spatial awareness.

Softball

An introduction to this fast-paced bat-and-ball game develops students' throwing, catching, and hitting techniques, while teaching the importance of tactical thinking and communication.

Rounders

A firm favourite, rounders helps pupils refine striking and fielding skills in a fun, inclusive setting. The game supports cooperation and sharpens decision-making under pressure.

Basketball

Through dribbling, passing, and shooting drills, students gain confidence and coordination. Small-sided games help build fitness and understanding of team dynamics and court positioning.

Table Tennis

Students improve their agility, reflexes, and focus through rallies and friendly competition. This sport offers a great opportunity to develop fine motor skills and concentration.

This half term, our students in Year 7 have been learning about the religion of Islam, including the 5 Pillars, beliefs about God and the daily life of a Muslim









