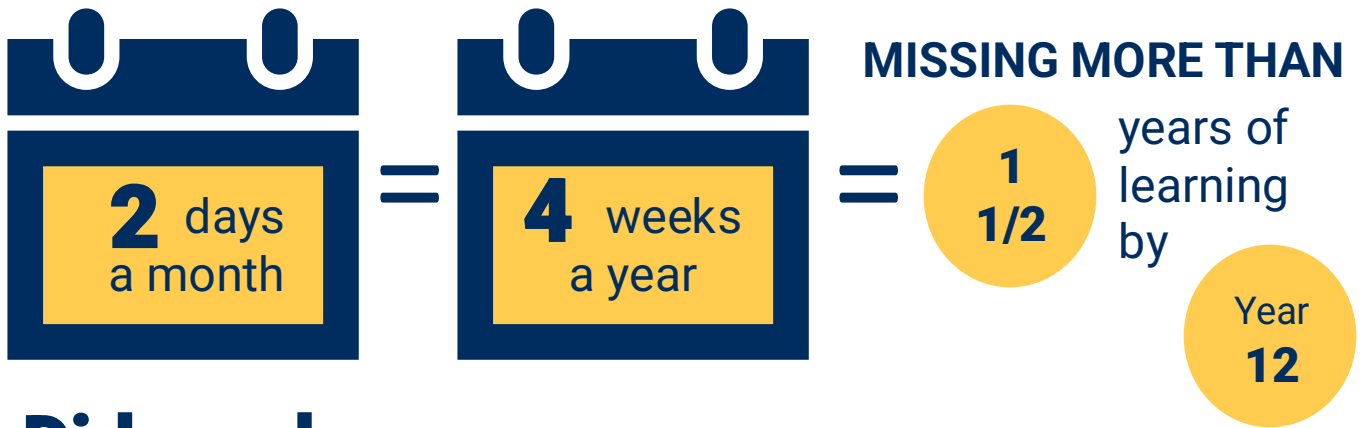
Crombie M (7C2) has been working really well in science recently. I've seen a really positive change in his approach to lessons and the work set. Well done and keep it up!



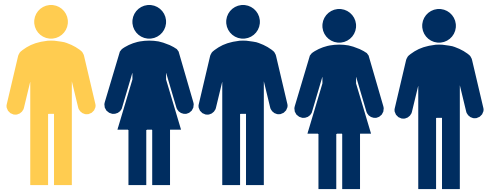

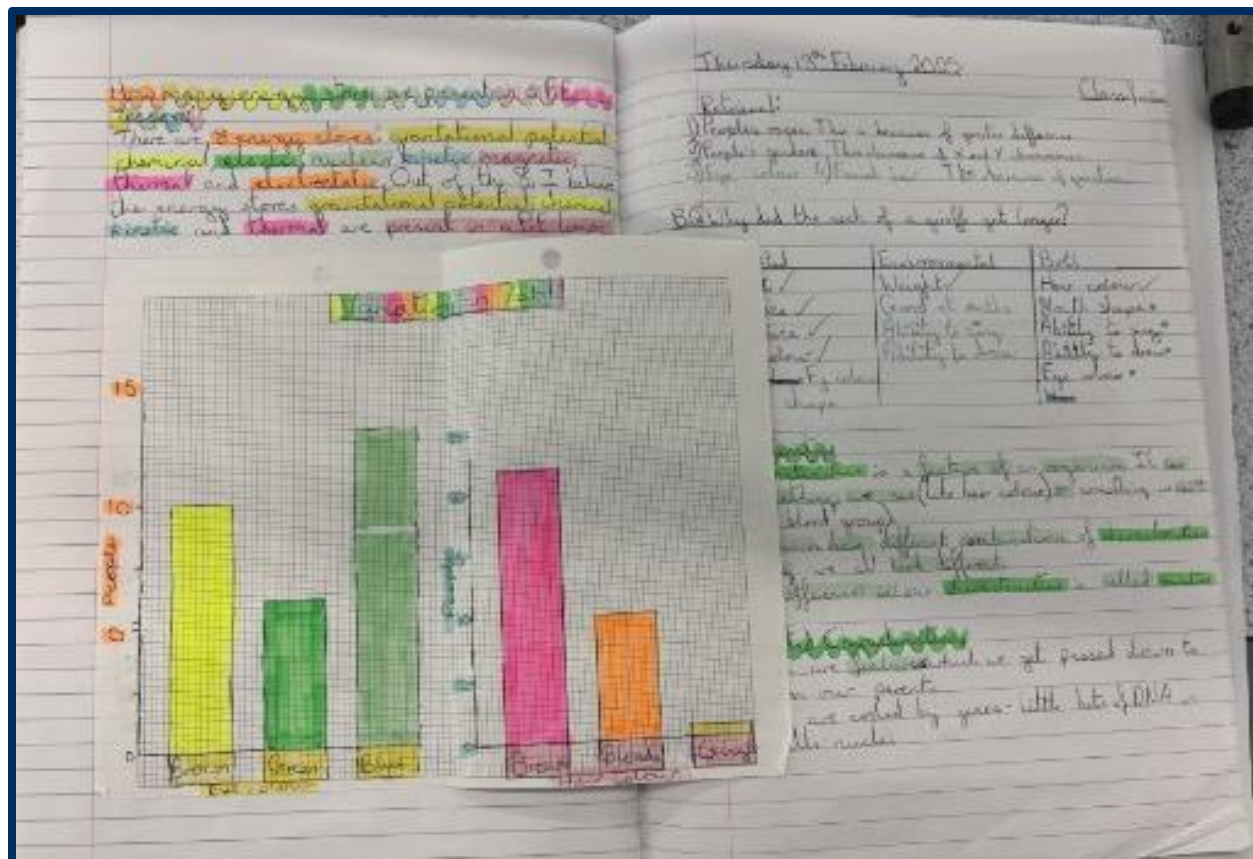

Upcoming Events/Curriculum:

Next half term students will be focusing on Physics looking at "What would life be like on Mars?" Students will explore space, the planets and our solar system and beyond. Students will also be studying sound and finding out if there is any way to stop a drummer disturbing their neighbours. This topic will look at how sounds is made, how it travels and how we hear.





Over the past few months, Year 7 classes have been studying how nature poses a risk to us all and looking into the possibility that we humans are increasing this risk.

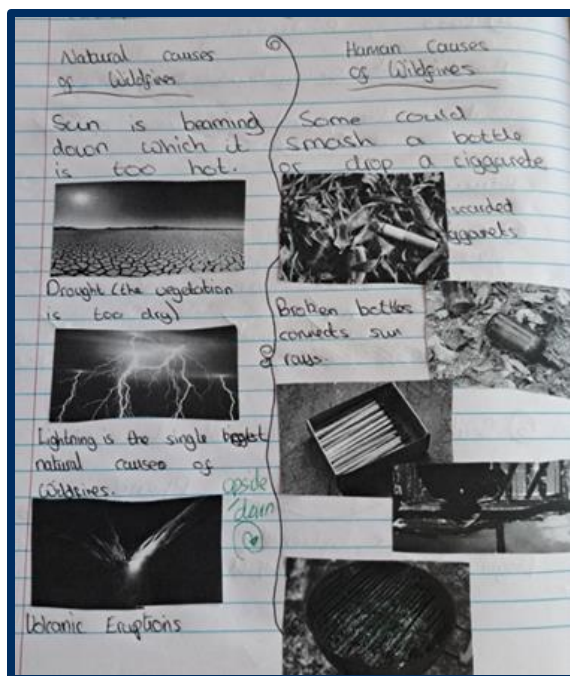
During this time, the Palisade wildfires in LA also took place which the students researched through lessons, reading comprehension and their homework.

Other hazards were studied both in the UK, Storm Eunice and the Beast from the East, and in Haiti where we looked at earthquakes and hurricanes, which rock this low-income country and the massive effects it had on this small Caribbean country. We looked at glaciers around the world and droughts which occur in the Sahel. Class discussions were had discussing if humans were to blame for the loss of these beautiful glacial landscapes and if the increased spread of desertification was also caused by the pollution caused by humans and the effects of climate change.

Upcoming Curriculum/Events:

A study of the opportunities and challenges facing Africa have recently been started and we finish Year 7 with a study of What Happens Where the land meets the sea?. This includes a trip to Flamborough Head and Hornsea for some of the Year 7 cohort.



During the second rotation Year 7 students have continued to develop skills in all areas of Design and Technology.

The Product designers have focused on user-centered design and worked hard to produce a final outcome that fits the Design Brief and Specification. The Desk Tidy products have then been rigorously tested, and students have conducted peer evaluations.

In Food, the students have again explored different techniques including fruit salad, fruit crumble, chicken Fajitas and pasta salad. They have demonstrated good knowledge of food hygiene and preparation and have a sound understanding of macro, micronutrients and the importance of vitamins and minerals within our diet and how they link to a healthy lifestyle.

During the second rotation of Textiles, students have successfully completed their key fobs demonstrating good sewing skills and have incorporated the use of different components such as buttons, sequins, beads and ribbon to further enhance their outcomes.





Year 7 have been busy creating their own blogs on the topic "Should social media be banned for Under 16s?". This topic sparked some interesting conversations with the students on how social media is used and why Australia have already put this ban in place. The Year 7s produced some lovely, professional looking blogs using the software Microsoft Sway.

This term students have been using Scratch to create programs using blocks including a program that asks them questions about themselves they then have to answer and a program that compares numbers and states which one is larger.

They have been learning how to create a flowchart and plan their programs before creating them on Scratch as well as programming terminology such as sequence, selection and iteration

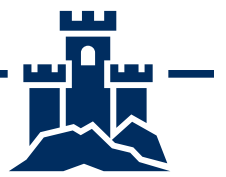

Students will be carrying on with coding skills in Scratch next term. We then look at spreadsheet skills in the last term of the year.



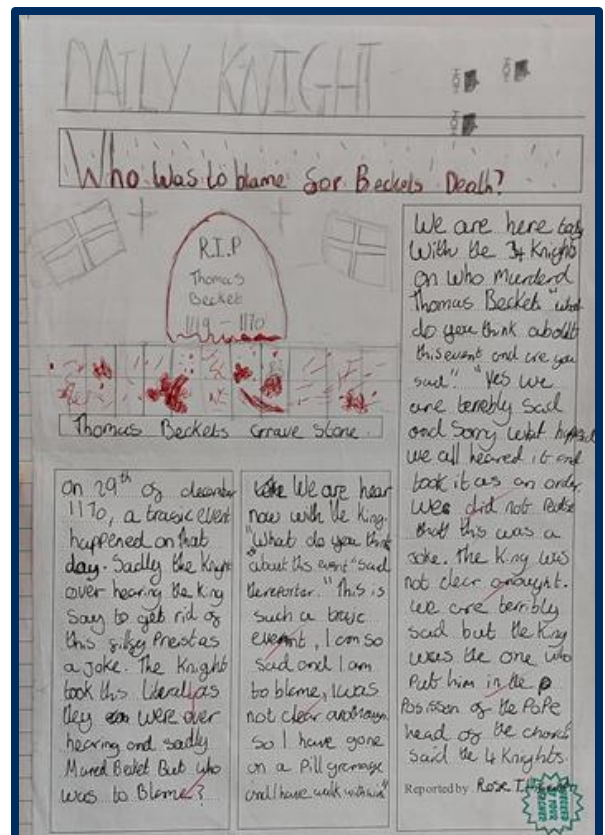
This term, students have been learning about how William established control of England after the Battle of Hastings using tools like the Feudal System and the Domesday Book. Students also had the opportunity to make castles as a homework project. These were examples of a variety of different types including motte and bailey castles, stone keep castles and concentric castles.

During the most recent half term, students have considered how life changed during the Middle Ages, focussing on the role of the Church, life for women and the impact of the Black Death. Students have also completed case studies on the reigns of Henry II and John; considering the impact these reigns had on the crown's relationship with the Church and barons.

Upcoming Curriculum/Events:

In the next term, Year 7 will be continuing to learn about the Middle Ages with a focus on the Middle East and Crusades.

After this, students will learn about the Early Modern period, focussing on the reign of the Tudors and the impact of the English Civil War.





This term, our Year 7 students have been developing their keyboard skills in music lessons. They have been learning to play simple melodies while also gaining confidence in reading basic music notation. Through fun and engaging activities, students are building a strong foundation in musical literacy, setting them up for future success in their musical journey. We are proud of their progress and look forward to seeing their skills continue to grow!
